

Introduction

We are pleased to submit the 2020 Annual Report of the William and Nancy Budd Scholarship Fund. This report includes the perspective of our administrator, Imelda Namayi, emphasizing the importance and impact of the Fund. The report also discusses the disruptions to the school year and challenges faced by the students due to the COVID-19 pandemic. There were no new Budd scholars in 2020 so there are no stories to share. Instead, we included several letters from the students expressing their gratitude for our support. We hope you will agree that the students' words are inspiring and compelling.

Scholarship Programme Report:

The National Council of Churches of Kenya has been engaged in scholarship for bright and needy students since the 1960s when NCCK was pioneering the Vocational training and cottage industries. The objective is to mould responsibility and self-reliance among the youth from disadvantaged backgrounds. Students from bright and needy backgrounds are able to access secondary school education and this has transformed lives and brought about sustainability as testified by the NCCK scholarship alumni.

Education Updates in Kenya i) Coronavirus Pandemic

The announcement that a patient had tested positive for Covid-19 in Kenya on March 12, 2020 sent the country into panic and elicited a flurry of response and control measures. The President of Kenya directed closure of all public/social gatherings. All education institutions across the Country closed and all learners were sent home in March 2020 before Term 1 was completed. The COVID-19 cases kept rising and the Government put in place a National multi-stakeholder COVID-19 response committee appointed by the president to review, guide and advise the Government on the reopening of schools. The NCCK Deputy General Secretary was nominated to participate in this National Level committee.

The government-institution - Kenya Institute of Curriculum Development commenced in April 2020 to provide school programs via the radio, television and online where all learners could access and continue with the learning. Some secondary schools organized online classes and worked with parents to pay facilitation fees to the teachers so that students could progress with the syllabus. Although learners from well off families had the opportunity to access the learning facilities and progressed, there were many learners who did not have access to learning due to financial hardships and inability to access digital learning platforms. Most NCCK scholarship students' families and guardians/parents were negatively affected by the COVID-19 pandemic because of the strained economic situation. Majority of them are casual labourers and they lost their livelihood during the COVID-19 lock down periods. During this challenging period, NCCK through regional staff and the religious leaders offered psychosocial and

spiritual support to the learners as part of the scholarship program and continues to do this.

Learning institutions remained closed until October 2020 when the Government announced a phased reopening of physical learning for the Form 4 students to resume their second term from 12th October to December 2020 and the other primary and secondary classes in January 2021. Twelve Form 4 students that are supported by the William Budd fund returned to school. We facilitated timely payment of their term 2 school fees and upkeep of Ksh 5,000 (approximately \$47) for each of the learners to facilitate travel and purchase school items at the time they resumed school.

In January 2021, the Form 4 students anticipate beginning Term 3 and the Form 3 students anticipate resume learning for Term 2 until the end of March 2021, at which time the Form 4 students will take the Kenya Secondary of Education (KCSE) final examination. [Editor's note: The Kenyan school year consists of three terms and typically begins in January and ends in October.]

ii) The Revising Academic Calendar

The Ministry of Education is planning to revise the school calendar for the years 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023 due to the extended period away from school since the closure of learning institutions in March due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

iii) Recruitment of 2020 Intake

The COVID-19 pandemic has negatively impacted our scholarship program. NCCK normally conducts recruitment on new intake in the Month of April each year however, 2020 recruitment was not done because schools were closed and it was not clear when they would resume because of the lock down measures due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Following the government's decision to revise the 2020/2021 and 2021/2022 academic calendar, NCCK plans to facilitate the recruitment process for the 2021 intake which will be done in the nine regional offices involving the County Committee. The County Committees constitute heads of churches, clergy, laypeople including women, representatives of persons with disability, and the NCCK regional staff in the region.

The scholarship program gives the beneficiaries the opportunity to be in school without interruption due to an inability to pay school fees. This enables the students to concentrate and excel in their class work.

One of the major challenges this program faces is the limited available resources to support many requests for the bright and needy students. However not all were enrolled to the program due to a fixed number that the available resources can accommodate.

iv) Beneficiaries Retreat

NCCK had planned to hold a student retreat in the year 2020 but it did not take place because of the coronavirus pandemic.

2020 Highlights

<u>Student Enrollment</u>: The Budd Scholarship Fund is in its twenty-first year in 2020. Over its lifetime, it has supported 206 students from needy backgrounds with academic promise and exceptional character—optimistic and caring for others even as they face their own challenges.

In 2020, the Budd Scholarship Fund supported 29 students in secondary school. This compares to 38 in secondary students and 1 student in post-secondary education in 2019.

No new students entered the scholarship program in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Since there are no new students' stories to share with this report, we have included several letters written by the students expressing their gratitude for our support. These letters can be found in Attachment 5.

<u>Student Achievement</u>: Due to the interrupted school year, the students did not complete their studies in 2020. The students' achievement in the 2020 school year, currently scheduled to end in July 2021, will be included in the 2021 Annual Report.

The decrease in secondary cost is due to the interrupted school year and no new students in 2020.

Most post-secondary students receive sufficient funding from other sources (primarily the Kenyan government). Other students get loans that cover the full cost of fees because they are high achievers.

The average of Budd Scholarship funded school costs per student in secondary school in 2020 was \$217, compared to about \$298 in 2019 and \$408 in 2018 (at the exchange rate of \$1=K shillings 106). The average cost for post-secondary students was \$137 in 2019 compared to \$280 in 2018. The Budd Scholarship did not support post-secondary students in 2020.

The NCCK plans to continue selecting students each year from each of its nine administrative units, (aligned with the old provinces) each of which provided two Budd Scholars per year including one student from the Kinyoro Primary School near Kitale, Western Province, where Daniel Ritchie served as a Peace Corps Volunteer.

2020 Contributions and Transfers: Thirty-one contributors donated \$17,800 in 2020; the individual contributors are acknowledged in Attachment 3. We transferred \$21,000 to NCCK in 2020. The Balance Sheets and Profit and Loss Statements as of December 31, 2020 can be found in Attachments 1 and 2.

Reserve Fund: The Reserve Fund was created in 2010 and is managed by Platt Investment Counsel, LLC through an Ameritrade account. The fund increased in value by \$14,445 (13.2%) in 2020.

Fund Management: At the 17th Annual Meeting on August 9, 2020, the Board discussed the difficulty communicating with NCCK due to offices and school closures due to Covid-19. While the students are still in need, the Board recognized this may be a difficult year for soliciting new donors. Despite the concern in August 2020, the board was able to raise funds from 31 donors by the end of 2020 including 11 new donors. The board made an effort to broaden the donor base given that many donors have supported the fund for more than ten years.

William Budd III and David Budd continue making periodic updates to the website. Mary Budd Logan continues to work with Maddy Hansen to develop the students' stories into video for marketing materials. These videos have been added to the website and can be viewed at http://buddscholarship.org/.

Emily Budd Baillos and Michael McCarthy produced the 2020 Balance Sheet and P&L Statement. Emily Budd Baillos and William Budd III created this Annual Report with support from the board members.

The Board members continue to meet on a monthly basis.


